# On Friday and some Saturday afternoons this summer, the lilting strains of Bach and Beethoven have echoed through Hospice Home, courtesy of a friend of Visiting Nurse who believes in the power of music to calm those facing the



end of life.

Cellist Deborah Nitka Hicks joined with violinists Alexandra Tsilibes and Yana Bourkova-Morunov to perform musical interludes that can be enjoyed by both patients and their loved ones who are at Hospice Home.

Each of the musicians is a performer with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic. The supporter began the program when a friend was staying at Hospice Home and she believed the music would help soothe the patient and their family and loved ones. Our supporter reached out to Nitka Hicks, one of the Philharmonic's musicians to begin this program.

"I felt honored and a lot of sadness for (the patient's) family," Nitka Hicks said. "I was honored and touched to play for (the patient)."

It was apparent how much the music was appreciated by others who were visiting or staying at Hospice Home and our supporter decided to continue the weekly performances through the summer. Continuing the weekly concerts has given the musicians a sense of purpose, Nitka Hicks said.

"It gave me a sense of looking outside myself," she said. "To play for somebody else's benefit and the other listening – it's an opportunity do something for others."

Bourkova-Morunov has experienced the support of Visiting Nurse through Hospice Home and the Peggy F. Murphy Community Grief Center.

"My very close and dear friend has passed at the Hospice Home here, so it is a special place for me. Hospice Home is wonderful. I only wish that everywhere on our planet people could have such caring environment at the end of life," she said.

Also, in the wake of his father's unexpected death from Covid-19 last fall, Bourkova-Morunov's husband received support from the Grief Center.

Tsilibes said she appreciates the peace of Hospice Home. She's seen the benefits of hospice in her students' families.

"It was a very caring relationship," she said. "Peace and dignity."

"I am just hoping that our music provides some soothing comfort," added Bourkova-Morunov. "It is a great privilege to be filling such a sacred space and time with the sound of our instruments." (continued from previous page)

"On behalf of Visiting Nurse patients, their families, our volunteers and staff, we are grateful for the music that these talented artists have provided at Hospice Home each week," said Visiting Nurse CEO Leslie Friedel. "We are truly thankful for the generosity of our community supporter that is making this experience possible. Music has a way of providing peace by engaging memories. These musicians are calming hearts for those that are losing their loved ones. Many thanks to the musicians who have allowed this experience for our patients and families at Hospice Home."

Hospice Home opened on Homestead Road in February 2001 and is the region's only freestanding inpatient hospice unit that provides 24 hour a day symptom management with hospice professionals. In the 20 years since it opened, we have cared for more than 10,000 patients and their loved ones.

Music therapy has been shown to provide many physical and emotional benefits in the dying. Visiting Nurse provides music therapy in the field and at Hospice Home as part of our holistic, compassionate care services. Here are two others who have benefited through Visiting Nurse's Music Therapy program:

# **United in love**

Ardelia Williams, who went by "Dee," and Wilbur Glenn Williams shared a special bond during their 69-year marriage. They were so close that when Wilbur died in February

2021, Dee followed him just 17 days later, their daughter, Lasana Ritchie, said.

The Williams were an institution at Marion College, now Indiana Wesleyan University in Marion, their home just across a quiet lane from the university. Dee was an art teacher for 35 years, specializing in everything from weaving to stained glass, while Wilbur was an Old Testament professor who often taught in character. He won Professor of the Year eight times during his tenure. He also led 156 trips to Israel over the years. The Williams will be honored by the university in October with a banquet and installation of Dee's work.

After Wilbur and Dee were diagnosed with dementia several years ago, Lasana, an art

teacher like her mother, moved from her Virginia home back to Marion to care for her parents.

"In January 2019, I became my parents' fulltime caregiver to manage finances, the house, γardwork, meals, and rentals. I repaired, contracted, painted, shopped, entertained, processed laundry, scheduled medical appointments and surgeries, while also listening through the night as possible when time and place began to slip from their grasp causing them to wander the house and end up in the emergency room again," Lasana recalled. "I learned to enter their reality, slow down and be content to not accomplish tasks, but to sit with them. I learned joy, presence, and to know them in a way I had not yet done."

For two years, she cared for her parents with love and support from Visiting Nurse, including Music Therapy, which "opened up a part" of her parents that had been locked away due to dementia, providing meaningful moments with the couple's other daughters, Ranada and Malana. # Hospice Home Campaign Update

Since 2001, we have cared for over 10,000 patients, ranging in age from 5 months to 103 years old. In addition to those patients served, we have also supported their family and friends. The result is that thousands of individuals have benefited from the one-of-a-kind experience of Hospice Home.

As a reminder, Hospice Home is a 14-bed hospice inpatient facility that has a much different feel from a hospital or any other healthcare setting. It has family gathering areas set up much like a living room in someone's home, a kitchen, sunroom, chapel-like reflection room and family conference areas as well.

In 20 years, a facility like Hospice Home experiences wear and tear. 



1 What are γour credentials and job duties?

I obtained my Master of Science degree in Mental Health Counseling from the University of Saint Francis. My responsibilities as a Grief Counselor include reaching out to families who have utilized our hospice services to offer support, providing individual counseling to Visiting Nurse families as well as individuals from the community, facilitating grief support groups, and providing a space for Visiting Nurse staff to process their grief.

How did γou come to work at Visiting Nurse?

My mentor worked as a grief counselor at Visiting Nurse and made the decision to enter into private practice. She encouraged me to apply for her position, and I was more than happy to explore the opportunity!

Can you describe what a typical day is like?

A typical day consists of multiple individual counseling sessions. Our team has experienced a great increase in referrals since I came on board in 2016. In between counseling sessions, I am usually making initial calls to new referrals or to our VN families who have recently experienced the loss of their loved one.

What drew γου to γου rspecialty?

Prior to working at Visiting Nurse, I was employed as a clinical counselor at a residential addiction facility. I was drawn to working more specifically in the field of grief after witnessing the impact that loss can have on all aspects of an individual's life.

  Serving as a companion to individuals and
  families who are going through the unimaginable.
- What's something unusual about γου?
  I add jalapenos to just about everything that I eat.
- What's the best part of your job?

Having the opportunity to walk alongside those who are hurting from all different walks of life. It's amazing to see the resiliency that individuals can demonstrate and the healing that they are able to find while navigating through their grief. I learn so much from my clients!

I love spending time with my family, especially anytime that we are able to be outdoors. My hobbies also include basketball, volleyball, and I would love to travel more in the future.

What is your secret ingredient?

Jalapenos! Just kidding...I would say kindness. I try to practice kindness on a daily basis because you never know what someone else is going through. It just makes life easier!



# Why I give: Randy G. Hix

I give to Visiting Nurse (and have a hospice license plate) in memory of my father. I had always heard good things about hospice, but I had never experienced it personally. A few weeks before my dad died, hospice workers started providing comfort and, more importantly, advice and information, to my family. Since this was our immediate family's first death, none of us were sure what to expect. Hospice nurses regularly visited my mom and dad in the nursing home and provided support and facts on what was coming. When it did finally happen, they were there with the family as my dad passed on. My mom, who had the most contact, could not say enough good things about the hospice workers. To my surprise, some even showed up to my father's funeral, which totally amazed me. They literally were angels sent to help us through this very difficult time.

So many of you have shared insights with the Visiting Nurse team about the impact that our services have had on your loved ones and family members. After more than a year of turmoil and fatigue, messages like these keep our team members going.
